

From the Superintendent's Desk

The older I get, the faster time flies by, but I think this summer break was the shortest on record. I hope you and your family were able to enjoy some time together. Welcome Back! The 2010-11 school year is now underway. We are excited about the new school year and the many opportunities and challenges it will present. The preliminary enrollment figures in the Gilbert Community Schools reflect an increase of approximately 65 students from last fall's first day enrollment. The first day enrollment of 1275 is an all-time high for the district. These enrollment figures represent the number of students who are attending classes in the district. The PK-4 elementary building enrollment count of 505 students, includes 33 PK students who will begin pre-school classes on August 23. The middle school staff welcomed 405 students in grades 5-8. First day enrollment at the high school building was 365 students. The official certified enrollment, which drives state school foundation funding for 2011-12, will not be established until October 1.

The summer months were once again extremely busy with facility improvements and projects. At the elementary school, many of the windows were replaced throughout the building. A new intercom system was installed. The portable classrooms received new carpet, drywall, and interior paint. Light fixtures and ceiling tile were also replaced. The elementary computer lab was relocated to a room adjacent to the media center and the music room relocated to one of the portable classrooms. The former music room will serve as the home for the district's new pre-school program. Roof repair work was completed at both the high school and elementary. New, brighter, and more efficient lights were installed in the west high school gymnasium. New carpet was installed in two high school classrooms. The wrestling room was reconfigured to become an improved laundry and storage space. Thanks to the generosity of the Gilbert Education Foundation, technology upgrades have occurred in all three buildings, with new wireless labs being installed in the elementary and high school. Several new mimios were purchased to allow teachers to utilize "smart board" technologies in their classrooms.

The school board has met with Tom Penney and Eric Beron from DLR Group to discuss and develop a timeline for the pre-design phase of four district's facility plan. Discussions have been held with the district's administrative team regarding programmatic needs. The formation of a community committee is underway and two charettes or focus group meetings are being organized, to be held in early September. The purpose of these meetings is to engage interested patrons and staff in discussions in order to gather additional input about facility needs, functions, and priorities. A special link will soon be established on the district's website to help keep our district patrons informed as we continue with our facility planning process.

We are excited about the new school year and look forward to the many events and activities that involve our young people and their families. As always, we greatly appreciate the tremendous support provided the district by its patrons. Organizations such as the Gilbert Athletic Boosters, PTO, Gilbert Fine Arts Boosters and the Gilbert Education Foundation, provide opportunities for parent and community involvement and, through their dedicated efforts, have contributed time and financial resources to provide the "extras" that make our district unique. Thank you for your continued support. We look forward to a great year.

DIBELS Reading Assessment

Three times each year, the Gilbert Community School District administers the DIBELS assessment, Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills, to students in grades K-4. This assessment is designed to help monitor student progress in the area of reading and allows the district to make ongoing instructional decisions during the course of the year. Because DIBELS is individually administered to each child, it is necessary to have students use a space that allows several quiet testing rooms available at the same time. For many years, students and staff have used the education wing facilities at Gilbert Lutheran Church for this purpose. The facilities provide the space required to properly administer the DIBELS, giving us the most accurate data upon which to base instructional decisions for our students. The Gilbert Community School District would like to thank Gilbert Lutheran Church for their continuing contribution to our literacy program.

Welcome to the Tiger Cubs Preschool Program!

Beginning August 24th, thirty three 4-year olds will start the academic year as the first preschool class in Gilbert Schools history. Because the district was awarded the Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program funding early this summer, we will be able to offer high quality preschool programming for some of the youngest learners in our community. The program is taught by a certified early childhood teacher and will utilize the Creative Curriculum within the activity planning, skills continuum, and assessment. The program/classroom will be working towards accreditation through the National Association for the Education of Young Children. Kids will be hard at work during a morning and afternoon session, Monday through Friday each week.

Here are some examples of what kinds of "workers" you might see in our classroom.

- Architects: designing, building, deconstructing, and showing representations
- Authors: hearing, listening, dictating, writing, and illustrating
- Chefs: reading, inventing, measuring, stirring, baking, and tasting
- Musicians: playing instruments, singing songs, repeating patterns, and dancing
- Mathematicians: comparing, measuring, counting, and sorting
- Scientists: exploring, experimenting, recording, and understanding
- Athletes: running, jumping, climbing, riding, kicking, throwing, and catching
- Comedians: NO EXPLANATION NECESSARY ☺
- Counselors: sharing, taking turns, negotiating, and getting along
- Doctors, Gardeners, Paleontologists, Bankers, Veterinarians, News Reporters, etc.
- Teachers: modeling, showing, helping, and enriching



It does sound formalized, and it is, but, "shhhh", don't tell the kids. They seem to accomplish all of this during their play at school. Watch for updates in the newsletter as we hope to share more of the fun, I mean work, that happens each day in Gilbert Tiger Cubs Preschool!

Middle School News

For the first time in the short history of GMS, we will begin the year with over 400 students in our building. Although things are a little crowded, we should take heart in knowing that our long-term facility plans will address this issue. For the short-term, we will need to hire some extra help for areas such as band lessons, talented and gifted, and other need areas.

Teachers began the year by participating in professional development regarding the Iowa Core and Authentic Intellectual Work. These two efforts are focused on identifying the most important things to teach and then teaching those things in relevant and rigorous ways. The work done during this professional development was meaningful and will impact each classroom. If you would like to learn more about these efforts, please contact me (the principal) or ask your classroom teacher.

Finally, I would like to share some things that parents can do to help their middle school students to have a successful 2010-11 school year:

- Make sure your student gets enough sleep (9 to 9.5 hours is suggested). Getting to bed a little earlier is always a good idea.
- Set a time each night for homework. If there is not an assignment pending, require your student to read, study the chapter again, or begin projects that may be due in a week or two.
- Encourage your student to eat right and exercise.
- Check their assignment planner each day.
- Take interest in what your student is studying. Discussing what they are reading or learning
- Communicate with teachers. E-mail is an effective way of doing this.
- Bring them to school on time. 8:00 AM is start time at the middle school.
- Plan vacations for school holidays when possible.

As usual, the staff at GMS realizes what a great district we have. We also recognize how much time and energy you put into raising your children and supporting our school. It is truly a partnership. Thank you and we plan to have a great year.

Junior Parent Meeting: Mr. Jacobson is scheduling a junior parent meeting for the evening of Thursday, Sept 23rd at 7:00 PM in the high school commons. Parents will be informed about a number of important guidance activities that they may want their son or daughter to consider during the upcoming school year. This will include the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test, the ACT and SAT tests, college selection and career planning. The October meeting will be a good opportunity for parents to be brought up to date on these activities.

Attention Senior Parents! On Thursday, September 9 we will have our annual Senior Parent Night in the high school commons at 7:00 pm. During this time we will discuss the activities and responsibilities the seniors will be involved with. We will also discuss college planning, financial aid, scholarships, and career exploration. Please come to this informative meeting.

On October 13th and 14th all seniors will have two days during his or her Government class where they will have a chance to fill out **college applications for freshmen admission**. Please be discussing with your son or daughter about options for them after high school. It is recommended that seniors apply for college in the early fall in order to receive the best financial aid package available, along with better choices in dorm selection. If your son or daughter as already applied for admission they will learn about help tips and tricks to early scholarship money. Just a reminder, if your son or daughter needs a transcript sent to a college please fill out the transcript request form that is available in my office.

Tutors Needed: Each year junior high and high school counselors get requests from students and their parents to locate someone outside the school who can do some tutoring during evenings or Saturday mornings on an as needed basis. Often an older student at Gilbert can be encouraged to consider such a paid opportunity. Sometimes a student at Iowa State University can be secured to help out. This can often be "hit or miss"! This year again, the secondary guidance staff would like to identify adults in the community who would be interested in tutoring junior high or high school students for pay (or volunteer if offered). By compiling a list of those adults who are interested in participating and their preferences in terms of subject area and/or grade level, when a request for outside help comes to one of us, we can save both time and effort by referring to a ready-made resource list. Tutoring times and other details can then be arranged between the student and the adult tutor. Good Character Rules! Our 2010-2011 school year is off to a great start! We are all asking ourselves "How do we measure up?" when discussing good character. We explain character as a process of developing worthwhile traits and skills to be happy and successful with ourselves and others. Everyone should always be working toward improving their own character. It's part of growing to "Be the Best We Can Be!" Talk with your children about character when you see good examples, healthy choices, or great examples of decision-making. Surround them with positive influences and stress the importance of great friendships as they start a new school year.

Parking/ Drop off at the Elementary

Just a reminder to parents NOT to park in the teacher's west parking lot. There are parking spaces near the curb on the east side of school and in the north parking lot. Be sure to not park in the circle drive as it will obstruct the drop off spaces for our buses.

- Fourth graders will remain seated in the Commons area.
- Third graders will go to the Media Center before school.
- All second, first and kindergarteners will go to the gym and sit near their teacher's cone.
- Our morning bell and dismissal to classrooms is at 8:05 and students are counted tardy if they arrive after 8:15. Parents need to accompany their late students to the office to sign in!
- The afternoon dismissal is at 3:10. Please be on time, as our kids tend to worry if mom doesn't come right on time. If you need to change plans or pick up your child early, please notify our office before 2:30 p.m. With so many children in the building, we are often unable to meet last minute requests.

Start Your Day with a Good Breakfast

In reading on the internet at a great website for kids (www.kidshealth.com) I liked the illustration they gave about eating breakfast. Parents, adult educators, and research teams still keep saying that breakfast is the most important meal of the day. They compared your body to a car that has rested and "run out of gas" after sleeping the required number of hours. Students of all ages still need to "fuel up" before starting their school day. It's important to "fuel up" with the proper nutrition, however.

Breakfast Ideas (from <http://kidshealth.org>)

First the traditional ones:

- eggs
- French toast, waffles, or pancakes (try wheat or whole-grain varieties)
- cold cereal and milk

- hot cereal, such as oatmeal or cream of wheat (try some dried fruit or nuts on top)
- whole-grain toast, bagel, or English muffin with cheese
- yogurt with fruit or nuts



And now, some weird but yummy ones:

- banana dog (peanut butter, a banana, and raisins in a long whole-grain bun)
- breakfast taco (shredded cheese on a tortilla, folded in half and microwaved; top with salsa)
- country cottage cheese (apple butter mixed with cottage cheese)
- fruit and cream cheese sandwich (use strawberries or other fresh fruit)
- sandwich — grilled cheese, peanut butter and jelly, or another favorite
- leftovers (they're not just for dinner anymore!)

Need More Convincing? Just in case you need more evidence that eating breakfast is the way to go, kids who don't eat breakfast are less able to learn at school, get less iron (an important nutrient) in their diets, and are more likely to have a higher body mass index (BMI) which is a sign they may be overweight. On the other hand, kids who eat breakfast do better in school, are more likely to participate in physical activities, and tend to eat healthier overall. So, remember not to send your kids out the door on an empty stomach. Fuel up with a healthy breakfast.

We're off to a great start with a large number of students so we greatly appreciate your support and understanding!

PowerSchool is a web-based student information system that offers parents and students real-time access to grades, attendance, homework assignments, and course information. During the summer we installed the newest Version 6.2 to PowerSchool so parents/guardians will now have the ability to create an account that will allow t to access all your students from a SINGLE LOGIN and complete E-REGISTRATION. Notes from the Athletic Department

PHYSICALS: All student-athletes must have a current physical on file before they will be allowed to practice or participate in any athletic programs. A physical is good for 13 calendar months. Therefore, with the start of practice for fall sports being August 9th, they must have a physical that will take them through the season which will end sometime in November.

INSURANCE WAIVERS: All Student-athletes must have a signed insurance waiver on file in the athletic office.

SEASON TICKETS:

- Students will continue to have the option of purchasing an activity ticket at school registration or on line. The cost of the activity ticket will be \$40 which will provide admission to all sporting and fine arts events at Gilbert for the 2010/11 school year. Students will be required to show their activity pass at all events or will be required to pay the admission price.
- Game Admission for Varsity Contests will remain at \$5.00 for adults and \$3.00 for students without an activity pass.
- All Sub-varsity contests (grades 7-12) have an Adult admission price of \$2.00; students will be free to all sub-varsity contests.
- Season tickets will again be available for fans wishing to save the cost of individual admissions. This will be published soon. Season passes will be available at the Fall Sports Kick Off on Friday, August 20th and after the fall kick-off in the High School Offices.

REGULAR MEETING OF THE GILBERT COMMUNITY SCHOOL BOARD

High School Media Center

July 19, 2010

The regular meeting of the Gilbert Community School Board of Directors was called to order by President Marcia DeZonia, at 6:02 p.m. with the following members answering roll call: Chris Benda, Marcia DeZonia, Paul Livingston, Kim Mosiman, and Mary Zimmerman.

Motion by Zimmerman, second by Livingston to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

The board conducted a self-evaluation of its goals and operating procedures for the past year and discussed proposed goals for the 2010-11 school year.

Jack Boyl, representing Green Living Domes, Inc., spoke briefly to the board and provided information about the construction of monolithic domes.

Eric Fagervik, account manager for Coca-Cola of Ames, spoke to the board and answered questions about the beverage contract proposed by Coca-Cola for the district. Superintendent John Kinley reported that nearly all fire marshal recommendations have been addressed. He provided the board an update on recent discussions involving Story and Boone County superintendents, new AEA chief administrator Paula Vincent, and AEA partnership directors about the creation of a regional behavior program for students whose mental health and behavior needs are not being successfully met in the local school district settings. While there doesn't appear to be many short term solutions, Dr. Vincent indicated she will pursue the topic within the agency.

Motion by Zimmerman, second by Mosiman to approve the consent agenda, the minutes of the meeting held June 14 as amended and June 24, 2010, the bills and claims and the secretary's report for June. Motion carried unanimously.

Board President Marcia DeZonia reported on her attendance at the recent IASB Fiscal Conference. Two items of interest included discussions about school district bond ratings and questions raised about the single salary schedule required for implementation by school districts this year.

Hope Bossard, director of curriculum and school improvement, provided an overview of a tentative schedule for Fall Teacher Workshop Days. She reported the district had met all of its Annual Yearly Progress goals for 2009-10. A great deal of summer curriculum work has been done, with work being completed in 5-12 social studies and in technology education.

Staci Edwards, elementary principal, provided the board with an update on pre-school plans for 2010-11. The board discussed establishing a materials fee for pre-K students that would be appropriate for the program and in line with textbook and materials fees established for other grade levels. Mrs. Edwards also presented a plan for the pre-

school playground, as well as outlining a few needed repairs on current equipment and projecting future playground needs. The board agreed to allocate up to \$18,000 in SILO funds to support the purchase of equipment and the development of playground space for pre-school. This playground will also be available for use by kindergarten students and other age-appropriate children during non-school hours.

High School Principal Greg Fisher reviewed proposed changes to the 2010-11 High School Handbook.

Mrs. Edwards reviewed proposed changes to the 2010-11 Elementary School Handbook and the 2010-11 Preschool Handbook.

Mr. Kinley provided an update on summer building improvement projects. The elementary school window replacement project has been completed. Central States Roofing is nearly completed with roof repair work at the elementary and high school. New carpet has been installed in two high school classrooms and the portable classrooms. New drywall has been installed and painted in the portable classrooms. Ceiling tile has been replaced in the west classroom and light fixture covers are being replaced. Kinley reported that storm damage created some electrical problems at the elementary school that impacted air handling controls in the elementary school, the fire alarm system in the elementary, and the air conditioner and sump pump for the portable classrooms. Repairs are underway and insurance carrier has been contacted. The remodel of the high school laundry/storage area is moving forward. Drywall and electrical work is progressing and plumbing work will begin shortly.

Mr. Kinley provided the board with information about ridership on proposed bus routes for 2010-11. With the potential for some pre-school children riding route buses to/from school, it may be necessary for the district to suspend transporting open enrolled students. A clearer picture will be known after August 2-3 registration. The board directed the superintendent to communicate this possibility to parents of open enrolled students who currently ride route buses so they have adequate time to plan alternate transportation plans if necessary.

The board held further discussion on the proposed contract renewal with Coca-Cola. The board agreed to make available, per Healthy Kids Act Committee recommendation, 100% juices and water as food service ala carte items at the high school only this fall for a trial period of 8 weeks. The board set prices at \$1 for 20 ounce bottle of water and \$1.25 for apple and orange juices available for la carte purchase.

The board tabled a review of the following Board Policy series until a special meeting on August 9 at 6 p.m.:

- Series 200 - School Board Governance
- Series 300 - Administration
- Series 700 - Non-Instructional Operations and Business Services
- Series 800 - Buildings and Sites

The board tabled a first reading on three proposed new board policies until August 9:

- 206.1 - President
- 206.2 - Vice President
- 803.9 - District Inventory

The board reviewed the most recent enrollment projections for 2010-11, which now includes pre-school students.

The board reviewed a proposed K-12 Facility Planning/Design Phase Schedule prepared by the DLR Group. The board also talked briefly about the formation of a community committee.

The board reviewed the responses from two architectural firms to an amendment to the previous RFP requesting architectural services. The amendment requested supplemental information and interest in planning a safe room project in future school construction. The board later appointed DLR Group to serve as the district's architect in planning such a project.

The board discussed and gave its approval to a request to install a landscaped memorial behind the home team bleachers at the football field.

It was the consensus of the board to support the school administration's plans to dispose of school property currently in storage and of no value to the district. The board supported the sale of scrap items for salvage and the idea of a garage sale for other items that may be of value to patrons, but not to the school.

The board reviewed a list of items to be considered for legislative priorities for 2010-2011.

Motion by Mosiman, second by Benda to appoint Johna Clancy as Board Secretary/Business Manager/Treasurer for 2010-11. Motion carried unanimously. Board President Marcia DeZonia administered the oath of office to Johna Clancy.

Motion by Zimmerman, second by Livingston to designate the district's depository banks for 2010-11 as First American Bank with a limit of \$10,000,000 and Bankers Trust with a limit of \$1,000,000. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Mosiman, second by Zimmerman to designate Ahlers and Cooney Law Firm as district's legal counsel for 2010-11. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Zimmerman, second by Livingston to appoint DLR Group as architect for Safe Room Project. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Livingston, second by Mosiman to approve the Free and Reduced Price Policy Statement for 2010-11. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Zimmerman, second by Livingston to establish the following 2010-11 Board Goals:

1. Make significant progress on future facilities
 - a. Build consensus on plans for elementary and current high school renovation
 - b. Pass bond referendum
 - c. Successful bid on new construction
 - d. Support the development of a part of the website for facility information
2. Evaluate effectiveness of time allocated for PLC professional development
 - a. Regular reports to the board regarding use of PLC time

Motion by Zimmerman, second by Livingston to approve preschool consumable materials fee of \$25 per student per year. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Mosiman, second by Zimmerman to accept low bid from Mullenbach Construction in the amount of \$4,745 for drywall installation as part of laundry renovation project at the high school. Motion carried unanimously.

- Supports increasing the regular program state cost per pupil to the current maximum district cost per pupil.
- Supports setting allowable growth at a rate that encourages continuous school improvement and reflects actual cost increases experienced by school districts and AEAs. The priority is to increase and maintain the state cost per pupil and the spending authority associated with it to build a strong base for future education resources.

- Opposes changes to labor and employment laws unless they:
 - Advance excellence and equity in public education with the outcome of improved student achievement for all.
 - Are based on sound research and proven best practices with a demonstrated positive impact on improving student achievement.
 - Promote accountability by all for improved student outcomes. Include adequate resources provided by the state without a shift from other education resources or significant burden on property taxpayers.
 - Include a regular evaluation of the impact of changes on student achievement.
 - Balance the rights of the employee with the rights of management with scales tipped in favor of student achievement and student safety.
 - Require arbitrators to first consider local conditions and ability to pay; once the arbitrator determines the district has the ability to pay, the arbitrator should determine comparability.
 - Include a requirement that arbitrators demonstrate understanding of Iowa education funding and educational improvement.
 - Provide management with the flexibility to pay market competitive wages for shortage area positions, especially in the areas required to meet graduation and Iowa Core Curriculum mandates.
 - Preserve the constitutionally protected due process rights of school boards.
- Recommends that teachers and school employees be included with all other state employees and incorporated into one health care insurance program, creating a larger pool and reducing the cost for insurance coverage for all school employees.
- Proposes rolling the Teacher Salary Supplement funds into the state funding formula, eliminate TSS from categorical funding, and eliminate its exemption from ATB cuts.
